Achievements of the REMAP program's first phase – 2006 through 2008

- System planning and modeling begun using PSS/E software with all five regional system operators
- Institutional capacity developed at KOREM
- Signed agreement between KOREM and Kyrgyzstan's generators





REMAP – Phase Two

- Expansion of activities to all five Central Asian countries, plus coordination with Afghanistan
- Full-time project teams in each of the five Central Asian capitals
- Coordination with parallel USAID projects and other donor initiatives





Planned activities under REMAP – Phase Two – 2010-2013

- Modernization of regional system operator's telemetry and telecommunications systems
- *Improved system modeling capabilities;*
- Simplification of customs and tax procedures to facilitate crossborder trade in electricity
- Assistance to countries' regulatory authorities;
- Learning and adaptation of international experiences and bestpractices in system and market operations
- Assistance to Central Asian countries in improving conditions for attraction of new generation investments
- Optimal use of Central Asia's water/energy resources





Barriers to the creation of a single Central Asian power market

- Lack of political will
- No formal process in place
- Disputes on the use of trans-boundary waterways
- Immediate and concurrent participation of all Central Asian countries in the establishment of a single market is in doubt
