Each group will have a **designated facilitator (from Customs or PGAs)** to guide the discussion and ensure that all participants contribute.




A **rapporteur will be assigned to take notes** and prepare a summary of the group's discussion points, recommendations, and conclusions.

Possible Areas of Cooperation

- Submission of the sea manifest (master, co-loader, house, amendment, supplementary) through user interface between the logistics actor's application and the single window platform. Then routed to the Customs system through defined business rules
- Submission of the air manifest through user interface between the logistics actor's application and the NSW platform
- Submission of goods declaration, amendment and cancellation through NSW platform
- Interface with the National Trade Repository in validating the standard tariff configuration for declaration based on HS Codes nomenclature
- Standard XML format for PGAs' licenses, permits, certificates and others application procedure through user interface between the trader's application.



External Data that can Add Value

- Access to additional information beyond customs declaration data?
- Earlier availability of freight papers and commercial information prior to customs formalization?
- Can it support a dynamic risk management when reliable data from external sources be captured through a unified exporting and importing dimensions?
- How to use historic data for enhanced economic operator profiles?
- How to use data from e-commerce websites for fiscal risk assessment?
- How to use movement tracking services?
